#### RULES FOR COMPETITORS.

- 1—Everyone entering for Competitions must obtain an Entry Form and Ticket for each Competition. The Ticket must be attached to each exhibit Forms and Tickets may be obtained at the Municipal Offices, Promenade, from June 4th to 9th, between the hours of 10.30 and 12.30 and 5 to 7 p.m.
- 2—Fee of 1d, or 2d. for each entry must accompany the application of Competitors, according to the Entrance fee payable. If sent by post, a stamped and addressed envelope must be enclosed.

Only one entry by each competitor for each competition is allowed.

- 3—Articles which have won prizes in the various competitions will be exhibited.
- 4—(a) Everything sent in for Competition, with the exception of written work and cooked food, must be delivered to the Competition Secretary at the Town Hall on Monday June 11th, between the hours of 11 and 1, and between 5 and 7, and removed Monday, June 18th, between the hours of 9.30 and 11,30 or 5 and 7.
  - (b) Written work must be sent in not later than June 11th, to the Competitions Secretary at the Town Hall, and removed Monday, June 18th, between the hours of 9.30 and 11.30, or 5 and 7.
  - (c) Cooked food for competition must be sent to the Competitions Secretary at the Town Hall on Friday, June 15th, between the hours of 10 and 12 and removed the same evening between the hours of 6 and 8.
- 5—All entries must be the actual work of the Competitor
- 6—No prizes will be given unless sufficient merit is shewn or unless, in the Judge's opinion, sufficient entries are made.
- 7—The decision of the judges will be final.
- 8—Amateurs only are entitled to compete, except in Class III, for Domestic Cooks. In addition to Prizes, Certificates will be awarded.
