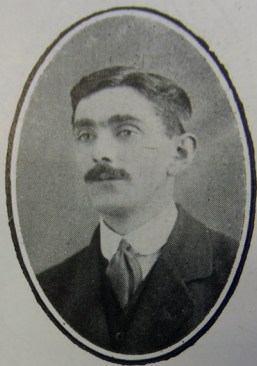

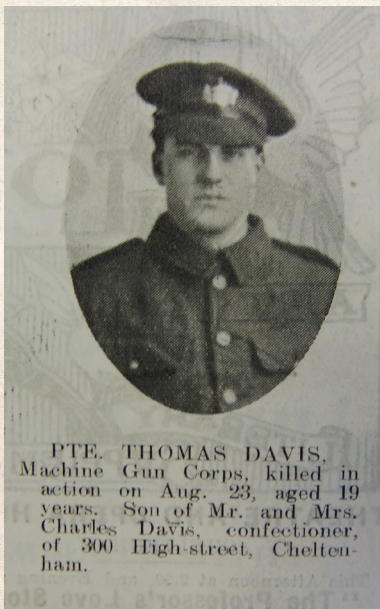

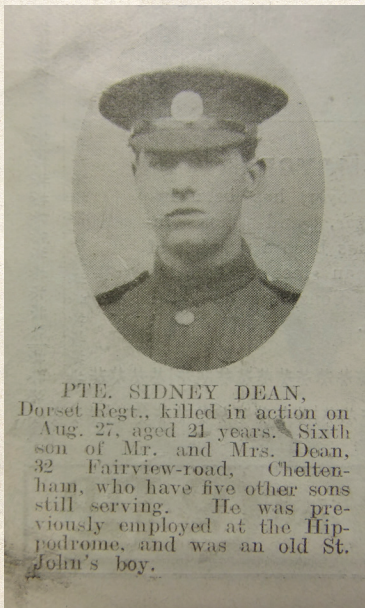

for any information of him.

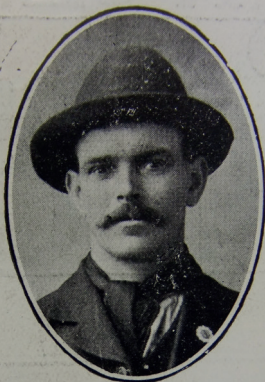
