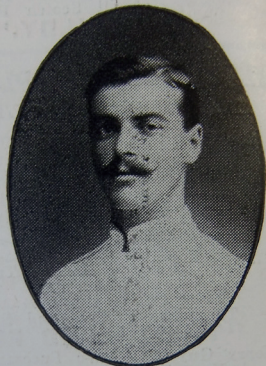


Capt. E. C. Willoughby (O.C.),

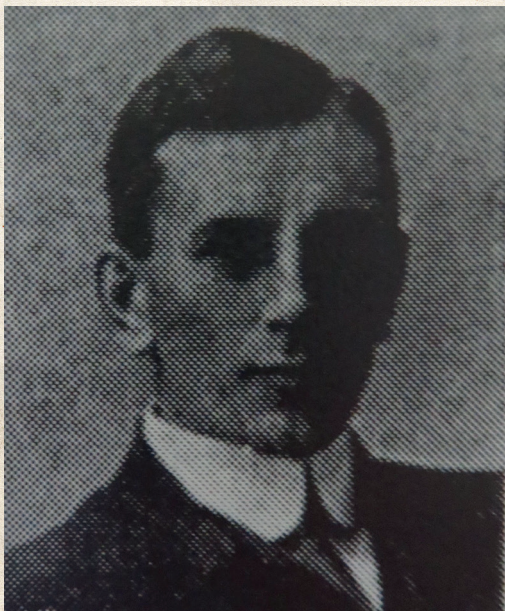
